Week 1 Term 2 2019

Good afternoon everyone and welcome back to term 2. It was so nice to be greeted this morning with smiling faces and see the yard full of kids playing and having fun! Some even completing a "stacks on"!



As always we are off to a busy start, with yesterday being a "flat out" professional development



day for all staff. The day began with a reflection on how well we have structured up the individual programs for children and what "tweaks" we can make to constantly improve our system. We then had Cara Barrie provide some information on the social and emotional program "Zones of Regulation". Cara is a Psychologist working with Lookout, this is a virtual school for those children in out of home care across the SEVR.

This is a great program and marries so very easily with our SWPBS and Respectful relationships programs. So when your children begin to talk of red, yellow, green and blue zones – you will know what they are referring to. I will be running an evening information session on this new program for all parents (We always know that the impact is greater when the connections continue between school and home). We haven't set a date yet, so keep an eye out please. The next session of



the day was around reading and using reading notebooks in class. These are to record your thinking and your wonderings whilst you read a book and the evidence shows that is dramatically improves comprehension for children.

The final session for the day was around a pilot Speech therapy program that we will be involved in. 754 has been allocated 100 hours of speech therapy time, provided through Gippsland Lakes Community House and Hannah Oman. This will not be direct work 1:1 with children but will focus more on upskilling the staff and in particular the support staff, who will be able to provide that 10 minute focus every day for the children needing some speech support. Again, home and school working together.

Today we "kicked off" term 2 with our 754 ANZAC assembly. Thank you to Mr Peter Sullivan from



Bairnsdale RSL for being our special guest speaker for this event. Peter is a very passionate man and never fails to reflect on just how lucky we all are to live in a free and safe environment, as we do. Peter's speech is attached for you to enjoy reading. Our four school captains ran the assembly with Mr Fraser's guidance and I was very proud indeed of the whole school, the respectful and positive atmosphere at the assembly. We then took some photos (attached) at the "Lone Pine" that is planted in our grounds. One of our grandfathers, Keith Hayles, was part of the RAAF contingent that planted this tree in 2015 and now his grandchildren are in our prep grade. Keith reflected that our tree is one of the few "still standing".

Continued:

Tomorrow is of-course ANZAC day and I encourage you and your family to join us at either the dawn service at 6.00am or meet outside Coles (Main St) at 10.30am ready to join the march and the 11.00am service. Our school captains will be involved in both the dawn service and also laying a wreath at 10.00am, prior to the march.



Friday is our 754 Cross Country and the program for the day is attached below, so if you should be able to identify the times that your children will be running. We have changed

the venue for this year and we will be starting at the Port of Bairnsdale and running along the river path. I look forward to seeing the prep event! The first two hours of the day is "normal" and we will head off to the races – keep your fingers crossed that the rain stays away for these few hours! (Then it can pour!)

The classroom challenge is ON!



Anzac day speech read by Peter Sullivan (Sully)

Thank you for asking me to come and talk to you again this year at your service to commemorate ANZAC day, which is an opportunity to reflect on how lucky we are, the sacrifices that have been made for us to live in a free and fair nation and to enjoy the company of our friends and family. It is a time to reflect on the importance of peace.

ANZAC is an unusual word. Originally it was not a proper word, it was a set of initials that described the Australian and New Zealand soldiers who were in Egypt in the First World War. The initials stood for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps and in 1915, those men, together with British, Indian and French soldiers were sent to fight in the part of Turkey known as the Gallipoli peninsula. It was because of the way those Australians and New Zealanders fought, and the way they faced the hardships and dangers that confronted them, that the initials became a word - ANZAC - which today is respected in both Australia and New Zealand.

What they did forged what has become known as the ANZAC spirit and that spirit has been the driving force behind all Australian servicemen and women ever since - in France and Belgium during World War I, and later in Europe, North Africa and the Pacific in World War II, Korea. Malaysia, Vietnam and Iraq, all of which happened long before any of you were born.

There are many ways to honour people who have served in Australia's armed forces. We can attend school services, like this one, wake up early for a dawn service or attend the ANZAC Day march in Main Street. We can also honour their service by wearing a poppy or an ANZAC badge, as a symbol of remembrance.

At all ceremonies you will hear a bugle play the Last Post. This piece of music was originally played in military camps to mark the end of the day and announce that all soldiers should be at rest. It is now part of many memorial services to symbolise that the duty of the dead is done, and they can rest in peace. One minute of silence follows the Last Post. During this time you may like to close your eyes and think not only about all the men and women who have served Australia in times of war and conflict and about those who have died but also the three and a half thousand young men and women currently serving with the Australian Defence Force in thirteen different countries around the world in service of peace.

They are soldiers, sailors and air force personnel. They are the real deal, the ones who are called first in time of crisis. We thank them for their willingness to stand for those who cannot stand for themselves, to stand for each other. There can be no greater trust, no greater bond, than to know that your mate will stand in front of you, no matter the odds, no matter the danger. They are the strongest and best Australia has to offer. We thank them for our way of life, our families' security, and the security of those they will never know. We are safe and we are free because of these fine men and women.

We pray that they come home to their loved ones and while they are away, we also pray for their safety as they serve unflinchingly to protect freedom around the world.
