ICAS ASSESSMENTS

ICAS Testing:

ICAS testing will be happening again in September. This year for your child to participate you need to register and make payments online via the ICAS portal prior to 31st July as we will not be accepting payments at the school. Respectful Relationships

Hi all, Respectful Relationships supports schools and early childhood settings to promote and model respect, positive attitudes and behaviours. It teaches our children how to build healthy relationships, resilience and confidence.

School Wide Positive Behaviours (SWPB)

Bairnsdale Primary School uses the PBS system across the school each day through a matrix, and the children have had input into producing the matrix for all to use.

Students have drawn pictures that demonstrate each PBS actions in bright colours on the matrix in each classroom.

Both the SWPBS and Respectful Relationships are a positive part of our school community, and are taught in class and across break times with great outcomes for all.
