Good morning! I am very pleased to say, as I am sure many others are also, it's raining! I am completely over the hot weather and am now keen for the cooler weather to arrive. I know that a number of our families have been impacted by the fires in one way or another and our very best wishes go out to them

Yesterday I had a wonderful member of our local community speak to me about wanting to donate some money to the school, to support a family / children who may be finding hardship at this time. The same wonderful couple donated last year also and that sent 4 children on camp that would

have found it very difficult otherwise. So a huge "thank you" for you wonderful generosity and kindness. I know that the families will be very grateful indeed.

I am always spruiking the importance of literacy and numeracy and I often hear families ask 'what can I do to help?"

The simplest answer of all is "Read with your children." Share a book, expose them to words and stories and pictures and all the excitement that can come from reading. Feel free to read with them, to them or have them read to you – all sorts of types of books, magazines and more. The impact is clearly seen in this table!



Yesterday we had 7 truck loads of soft fall delivered to the school, for both the playgrounds. The ACE group is coming today to spread it all out and bring the floor of our playground areas back into tip top condition. I must say that I was astonished at the cost – just on \$5,000.00 Whilst we never want kids to fall, at least their landing will be "softer"!





We have welcomed back Jeff Hathaway this week, into 34B. Unfortunately Meg Langley has been battling a significant hip injury and is currently in Melbourne having this seen to. So I had gravel rash on my knees and made plenty of promises to get Jeff back into a classroom for the time that Meg is away. I am extremely grateful to Jeff and I know that the children will continue to fire along with their learning, particularly as Naplan is looming! We are one of several school across the state that are part of an online trial for Naplan this year, so we will see how that runs. There is a practise trial day on March 28th. (Our grade 5 children will not be able to take part as they will be on the Melbourne camp)

Bullying Poster: Please take your time to talk to your child about the Bullying poster attached to the newsletter. I am totally convinced that every child in the school can comfortably tell me the definition of being bullied and they know the difference between what is **NOT NICE**, to what is **MEAN** and what is **BULLYING** – but when under pressure too many just default back to "I was bullied". Unfortunately many adults often do the same. We need to constantly remind students and adults of the differences: Sometimes and argument is just that - an argument. I feel that this poster explains the differences really well. I am happy to chat to you any time about any aspect of this work.

Something to Ponder:

We often talk about being kind, paying it forward etc – but just a check in – when was the last time that you actually did commit to a random act of kindness?

Helping your child understand what they are reading: PART 2 following on from last week.

Now that your child is a reader, you can share your best reading comprehension strategies (that you probably don't even know you use) to help him understand what he is reading.

But how?

Think about teaching a child to tie a shoe or ride a bike. You break down what you do unconsciously into teachable steps. The same goes in reading. I'm breaking down eight reading comprehension strategies that you can use at home.

2. Can I Get a Picture in My Head?

Encourage your child to get a mental picture of what she's reading. You automatically do this as a reader. Beginning readers are just getting the hang of it. So while you're reading, show your child how to use the descriptions to make a movie in her mind. If she can't get a picture in her head, it might be because she isn't understanding or needs more practice with this strategy.

3. I Think That _____ Is Going to Happen Next.

Does your child know how to predict? Help him use the story information to make reasonable predictions about what will happen next. Stop after a short passage and talk about it — share your predictions, too.

(You may need to define "reasonable" with some examples — for example, predicting that the wolf gets into a spaceship in the "Three Little Pigs" isn't a reasonable prediction.)

What is Harmony Week?

It is a time to celebrate Australian multiculturalism, and the successful integration of migrants into our community.

Australia is one of the most successful multicultural countries in the world and we should celebrate this and work to maintain it.

Harmony Week is about inclusiveness, respect and belonging for all Australians, regardless of cultural or linguistic background, united by a set of core Australian values.

Myth: Respectful Relationships will ban fairy tales

Fact: This is untrue.

In schools, the Victorian Curriculum provides opportunities for students to read fairy tales as part of both the Languages and English Curriculum. In early childhood settings, Respectful Relationships will be offered as a voluntary professional learning program to early childhood professionals. The training encourages early childhood professionals to consider telling stories with a range of different characters in various professions and roles. This provides a diversity of role models for children – for example, female characters who are firefighters, male characters who are nurses. In fact, as educators reflect on whether there is balance in how genders and professions are represented in toys and books, it is likely that more books and resources will be added to provide balance and diversity in representation.



The Boite Schools Chorus 2019



754 has taken part in The Boite Schools Chorus for a number of years. Unfortunately, last year, not enough schools enrolled from East Gippsland to go forward with a concert in Bairnsdale. This year we have the opportunity again to enrol in this project.

The Boite Schools Chorus is an un-auditioned massed choir project for schools and community youth choirs. Since 2004 the Boite Schools Chorus has involved over 10,000 students from across Victoria in 46 concerts in Melbourne, Ballarat, Bairnsdale & Albury.

The Boite Schools Chorus project invites students into a new world through song, builds confidence, broadens horizons and develops valuable performance and interpersonal skills. Each year the chorus focuses on a different cultural theme, which has included Africa, Pacific Islands, Seychelles, East Timor, South America, Indigenous Australia and the Caribbean.

In 2019, we are very pleased to announce we will be working with Jessica Hitchcock and Deborah Cheetham AO.

In the Boite's 40th year and the International year of Indigenous Languages, the Boite Schools Chorus will be exploring the Dhungala Choral Connection Song Book.



This beautiful collection of songs features the experiences and languages of Aboriginal Children from around Australia. Written and composed by Deborah Cheetham and Jessica Hitchcock through the Short Black Opera for Kids program, this valuable resource will reveal the beauty and complexity of Aboriginal languages through the powerful medium of song.

If you are interested -

- Practice will take place once or twice a week during the first half of break time.
- There will be two combined rehearsals with all students from our area in Bairnsdale on a Saturday or Sunday with all schools participating in the area.
- Concert date will be towards the end of term 3.

These are normally held at one of the schools involved in their hall or music room. The first in May/June and the other closer to the concert date.

On the day of the event we will have a technical run through with our band, students break for dinner, then we have our grand concert for families and friends.

Cost for students is \$50 (\$45 if we enrol before the end of Term 1). This includes the concert t-shirt. Schools pay an additional cost for music and materials.
