Hello Everyone,

School council: The first meeting of the school council for 2019 was held last Thursday the 21st February. The election process for the 2019 council has been concluded now and we will be welcoming some new members to our team. When members join school council it is for a 2 year stint and so every year "we welcome some and we farewell some". Last week I took 30 students to represent the school at the Central District swimming sports at the outdoor pool. 17 of these students have made it to the next round, Division Championships, which are being held today. If any of the individuals or relay teams get through to the next round of Regional Championships they will be held at the Sale Pool on the 16th of March. Helping your child understand what they are reading: PART 1

Now that your child is a reader, you can share your best reading comprehension strategies (that you probably don't even know you use) to help him understand what he is reading.

But how?

Think about teaching a child to tie a shoe or ride a bike. You break down what you do unconsciously into teachable steps. The same goes in reading. I'm breaking down eight reading comprehension strategies that you can use at home.

1. Does This Make Sense?

The **MOST** important thing you can teach your child is to realize when he does and does not understand what he is reading. Help him to stop frequently and ask himself, "Do I understand what's going on?" This can be hard for some kids. To be sure he's understanding, ask him to retell you what he just read. Teach him that if he doesn't understand, it's best to stop.

2. Next Steps If He DOESN'T UNDERSTAND:

- Reread
- Pick a book at an easier reading level



How do we learn about reading in our classroom at the moment?

- We find a quiet spot and read the whole time.

Respectful Relationships supports schools and early childhood settings to promote and model respect, positive attitudes and behaviours. It teaches our children how to build healthy relationships, resilience and confidence.

School Wide Positive Behaviours (SWPB)

Bairnsdale Primary School uses the PBS system across the school each day through a matrix, and the children have had input into producing the matrix for all to use.

Students have drawn pictures that demonstrate each PBS actions in bright colours on the matrix in each classroom.

Both the SWPBS and Respectful Relationships are a positive part of our school community, and are taught in class and across break times with great outcomes for all.

Myth: This initiative is trying to say that boys can't play with trucks and girls can't play with dolls

Fact: Absolutely not.

This initiative is not seeking to make children 'gender neutral' or trying to prevent girls from playing with dolls, or boys with trucks.

Respectful Relationships is about creating an environment in which children are not restricted by gender stereotypes and are free to explore and play as they choose.
